Ag In the Classroom (Session 4) Charles Crave. Hands on will describe these proven lessons in agriculture. From the field to the fork, we'll have plenty to occupy the inquisitive mind. *Counts for 1 point on Dairy and Livestock Project Member Activity Cards.*

Am I A Lion? An Otter? A Golden Retriever? What's My Personality? (Session 1) (6th grade and older) Ron Jakubisin, Positive Youth Development Educator. This is an interactive workshop that you will discover your personality style and how your style 'works' with other people's styles. We will use activities and discussion to explore ways to effectively communicate in teams, as a leader, with friends who have a different way of doing things, and even solving conflicts.

Australia (Session 1, 4) Jan Zander. Jan will share her images of her March 2020 visit to New South Wales, Australia and share updates on some of the areas affected by the recent bushfires. Enjoy tasting, smelling, and hearing some distinctive Australian treats! You might think you know English but can you understand Australian?

Basic Machine Appliqué (Double Session 1-2) Fee \$5. Limit 8. Anna Schultz, Carrie Hunt. Come learn this technique, which you can then apply it to any project. This session will require a machine with an adjustable zigzag. You will be appliquéing a butterfly that you can then take home and make into a pillow or wall hanging. The fabric, butterfly, fusible web and stabilizer will be provided. Supplies to bring: Neutral thread, scissors, pins, and your sewing machine in good working.

Beef for Beginners & Fair Sign-Up (Double Session 1-2) Andy Neff. Are you a new or young beef project member? Learn about your beef project and how to sign-up your beef for the fair. Fairbook changes will be explained. Discover the answers to your project questions, and find out who to ask if you have more questions. *Counts for 1 point on Livestock Project Member Activity Card.*

Build a Simple Machine (Session 1) Fee \$5. Limit 10. Designed for ages 7-8. Cameron Pokorny. Everyone will build, test and analyze a simple machine out of household recyclables (materials provided).

Burlap Wreath (Session 2, 3) Fee \$5. Limit 10. Jenny Appenfeldt, Kris Rennhack. Learn how to make a Christmas or spring burlap wreath. Kris will show you how to put the wreath together and how to add decorations using your choice of ribbon.

Buzzing About Pollinators (Session 3, 4) Ages 8 and up. Marianne Zastrow. Did you know that all the hair on an ear of corn represent each kernel of corn? If the hair is not pollinated the kernels will not develop correctly. We will talk about all the insect pollinators as well as the wind and rain that can pollinate our food and ways to help keep the insect pollinators alive.

The Chicken and the Egg (Session 4) Janelle Wiebelhaus-Finger. Explore one of the main food products produced by chicken and other poultry--the egg. Learn how they are produced and what differences you may notice when you enjoy this nutritious food. *Counts as 1 meeting toward project requirements for poultry members.*

Coding UNPLUGGED! (Session 2) Limit 12. Braden, Jody, Lydia Paplham. Cloverbuds and Exploring members. Coding is a set of instructions written by a programmer that the computer carries out. Sequential activities help children learn different aspects of computer coding. There are so many benefits of coding for students that go beyond the use of a computer. Coding has become a new form of literacy, like a new language but for computers. With these unplugged activities, anyone can learn the concept of coding easily without using the computer at all!

Culture Exchange: Summer Opportunities (Session 3) Angela Byers-Krantz, Lerious Wilson, Nao Murata. Bring the world to your front door. Hear about Japan and Liberia from current exchange students. Learn about the different opportunities offered by 4-H International Programs, including how you can participate in a cultural exchange by hosting this summer, and travel overseas next summer.

Dairy Project-Could It Be For You? (Session 2) Dairy Youth Advisory Committee (DYAC). Could this project be for you even if you don't own a dairy animal or have a place to keep one? The answer is "Yes." We will explore the ins and outs of the Dairy Project and help you discover if this project could be for you. Learn about the networking and how to find a calf to care for and show at the Fair.

Digital Technology (Session 2) Tech Changemakers Team. National 4-H Council and Microsoft are working together to close the connectivity gap in rural areas by empowering teens to bring technology and digital skills access to their communities. The lesson plans include: *Something is Phishy* and *Strong Passwords*. Please bring your own device; Smartphone is good. We will show you things on your device and help answer your questions.

Dish Gardens (Session 3) Fee \$4. Limit 12. Leanne Gensch. Participants will make a dish garden to take home. Please bring small, decorative items such as smooth rocks or a resin figurine to add to your garden. If you have a shallow container (without a hole in the bottom) which you would prefer to use, feel free to bring it along. *Children under 9 years old are asked to have an adult accompany them.*

Dogtastic Genetics: A recipe for traits (Session 3, 4) Fee \$2 Limit 12. Melissa Litherland. Join us for a fun and hands on session about genetics. Participants create and decode a "DNA recipe" for man's best friend to observe how variations in DNA lead to the inheritance of different traits. Students will also learn how to isolate DNA from strawberries and create a special genetic treat!

Doodle Drawing (Session 4) Fee \$3. Limit 12. Connie Alderden. Doodling is an enjoyable and non-intimidating art form that we all probably do at some point or another. We'll explore some easy to create doodle forms. We'll put some doodles together to make a fun card that you can give to a friend or family member. Each person will receive a micron pen that you can take home with you to work on more doodle art.

Duct Tape Engineering (Session 3) Randy Clark. Duct tape is often a go-to necessity for making repairs and constructing solutions at home, at work, and on the farm. Learn about the mechanical properties of duct tape and then engineer and build a wallet or carry-bag out of only duct tape. Learn how to use duct tape to its advantages and avoid its weaknesses.

Duct Tape Flower Pen (Session 4) Fee \$2. Limit 12. Allyson Roberts. Are you interested in duct tape? Learn how to make a flower pen using duct tape. You can make it during this session and take it with you.

Felted Easter Eggs (Session 2 or 3) Limit 12. Jan Zander. Learn how to use wet felting to make a colorful Easter egg decoration. Easy enough for Cloverbuds to do.

Flight Adventures (Double Session 1-2) Fee \$3. Limit 12. Brian Lerwick. Learn the adventures of flight and basics of aerodynamics. Make a rubber band powered balsawood plane. The gym will be used in Session 2 for experiencing the first flight. *Under grade 6 should be accompanied by an adult.*

Horse Arts and Crafts (Session 1) Fee \$3. Limit 12. Sara Witzel. Join Sara to make horseshoe related arts and crafts! Projects to include horseshoe picture frames and possibly horseshoe beading.

Horse Gymkhana 101 (Session 2) Katy Witzel. Katy will teach a session on beginning speed with your horse. Learn some ideas to try to help reduce your time and more about patterns for the different classes.

Hydraulic System Engineering (Session 4) Randy Clark. Hydraulics are used all around us in everything from piping in our home to the brakes on our cars. Learn the basics of hydraulics and then build a simple excavator boom or other device using syringes and tubing. You will gain an understanding of how work can be done by pushing air or other hydraulic fluids.

Inside a "LIVE" TV Newsroom (Session 2) Limit 15. Karen Husimann. The professional staff from Watertown TV will teach you the ins and outs of a LIVE TV studio. From being a news anchor, to weatherman, to a roving reporter. Using our NEW wireless equipment, you will create your own "newscast." Come to this hands-on experience and you will be ready for your close-up or your directorial debut!

LEGO Club! (Session 1) Limit 20. Braden Papham. Ever wonder what a LEGO Club is like? Come experience LEGO club and be inspired to build. Participants will build challenges, play LEGO games, participate in team builds, and speed build competitions. Take home ideas and games.

Rabbits (Session 1) Bill Meyer. Learn about different rabbit body and fur types, along with hands-on opportunities with the rabbits. Don't forget to study up for a breed identification game! *Counts for 1 point on your Small Animal Project Activity Card.*

Rabbit Hopping (Double Session 3-4) Jillian Blackburn. Rabbit Hopping for fun and competition: this class is open to all ages and abilities. Rabbit Hopping has been around for many years in Europe and about 15 years in the state of Wisconsin. This sport is open to bunnies whether they are a pet or pedigreed and gives owners the opportunity to interact in a new and exciting way with their furry friends that is great exercise and entertainment. The gals from the Kewaunee County Hopping project will give participants an interactive presentation on the ins & outs of this sport. The class will cover selection, training, and the rules of competition. Feel free to bring your bunny to give them a chance to check it out too. Rabbits are required to wear an H style harness with 6 foot lead for competition. They can be purchased at most pet stores & fleet farm (cat harness).

Record Books (Session 3) Record Book Committee. Let's have fun with record books. Pick up pointers from the record book committee following the past years revisions. Get your questions answered and help youth start their record books now. There is a lot that has happened already this year that can be written in the record books! We can make our time spent completing the books a worthwhile process.

Painted Rocks (Session 1, 2) Limit 12. Lisa Schwartz, Joanna Schwartz and Charlie Schwartz. Traveling painted rocks have been connecting communities around the state! Participants will have the opportunity to paint rocks that support 4-H projects. Opportunities to practice painting techniques will be available for project members.

Stenciled Sign (Session 3) Fee \$5. Limit 10. Connie Alderden. Wood signs are very popular and are a wonderful way to add a rustic touch to your home. However, they can be expensive. In this workshop we'll take a look at some methods for creating your own wood signs and will stencil a project that you can use for your home. Bring an apron or paint shirt for this workshop.

String Pull Painting on Canvas (Session 1) Fee \$3. Limit 15. Karen Weihert, Becky Weidner. Becky owns *The Workshop* art and craft studio in Columbus. She will help participants create beautiful art by dipping strings in paint and pulling across the canvas to make flowers, feathers, or abstract designs. Participants will watch a demo of the process, practice on the group sample canvas, and create their own string pull canvas. Class incorporates color mixing, design, and unique painting process.

Tree Identification (Session 2) Steve Ziobro. Steve worked at McKays in Waterloo for 33 years. He will show you how to identify native Wisconsin forest trees using leaves, bark, fruit, form, branching structure, and location.

Planting Vegetables/Flowers (Session 4) Leanne Gensch Helpful hints for planning your vegetable garden. Companion planting, variety selection, and planting dates will be discussed.

Vietnam War (Session 1) Bob Krueger. Learn about the Vietnam War through the stories of someone that was there. Bob will bring his Vietnam War collection and share stories of being in the Vietnam War. Special guests from the United Vietnam Veterans of Hartford.

The Watershed Protection Game (Session 3) For ages 10 and Up. Chris Lilek. The Watershed Game is an interactive and fun group game that helps people understand the connection between land use and water quality. Participants learn how a variety of land uses impact water and natural resources, and learn how their choices can keep their local waters clean! Participants work in teams (Farm, Forest, Industry, City) to plan how they will manage their property safely and encourage community growth and health. Spending money will be provided!

Youth Leadership 101 (Session 4) Marie Witzel. You signed up for the youth leadership project now what? This session will explore some of the building blocks to youth leadership and answer some questions about leadership and the youth leadership project. Join Marie Witzel, Positive Youth Development Educator to learn more about the mystery of youth leadership.

YOCA (Double Session 3-4) Fee \$3. Amanda Young. *Youth for the Quality Care of Animals*. For all livestock, dairy, and small animal members to learn about caring for their animal projects and insuring a quality food product. Required for county fair Beef, Sheep, Swine project members to complete their Activity Cards. Required for youth showing Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits or Poultry at the State Fair. After completion of the course instructions and a coupon code will be given to participants to complete the online certification process. *Counts for 1 point on Dairy, Livestock and Small Animal Project Member Activity Cards.*
